At the end of 2021, the Kucetekela Foundation carried out the recruitment project. 25 partner schools were identified as potential places where the 10 earmarked students could be drawn from. Over 150 grade seven students were interviewed in the group interview stage. Out of these, 30 were selected to take the KF exam. Of the 30 that sat for the KF exam, the top 15 students were invited for further interviews with their parents. Of the top 15, the outstanding schools included Mount Makulu Primary School, St. Lawrence Primary School, Jesus Army Primary School and Lotus Primary School. Finally, 6 students were selected to be on the KF scholarship starting in 2022.

The students picked for the KF scholarship are: Clariss Mwape, Thawanda Neba, Francis Siboli, Nelly Makondo, Catherine Mumbi and Jackson Banda. The students exhibited great academic aptitude and a wide range of talents such as singing, poetry, sports, public speaking and leadership.

In this issue, we get a brief insight about these students who have huge potential to achieve great things in years to come and welcome them to the KF family.



With all wonderful things talked about KF, financial aid was not the only thing the organization would offer me. We were told that finalists would be selected based on the overall assessment. The home interview stage was one I was very much sure of scoring high marks because we had a thorough preparation. Later in the year mom received a phone call that I had made it for the scholarship and we were again invited to the office but this time around to be oriented. I was overjoyed with this news and looked forward to attending high school at one of the best schools in Zambia.



I come from the Mount Makulu area where I have spent seven years but at no point did I hear of an NGO that sponsors vulnerable children who are academically excellent. I only found out when my Science teacher came into our class to take the names of students who had outstanding performance.

In primary school I had a fear of talking to new people so when the Kucetekela Foundation team came, I got worried and thought of my performance during the group interview. Luckily, the head teacher briefly uttered some words of encouragement to us and this made me feel relaxed. During the interviews, I realized that it was not as tough as I imagined. The team interviewing us was very friendly and patient. Quickly I picked up my confidence and even volunteered to solve a Math problem on the board. Every student did well that day but we had to wait for the results on who had made it to the next round. Four students from Mount Makulu were later invited for the exam at Chalo Trust School where we met other students from different primary schools. In between breaks, I interacted with others including students already in the program as well as the KF staff. I remember Abraham Tembo who talked about his experience being in KF and how his life has transformed.

After the exams, we went to our various homes and despite the exam being hard, the experience was unforgettable. I arrived at my primary school to the good news that I passed the exam and was invited for a family interview. This was the best news ever. I was also happy to hear that two of my other friends had also made it. We were slowly approaching the final grade seven exams which I prepared adequately for. My target was to get 800 and above but I fell short by 20 marks.

Based on my academic performance and several other factors I finally got the scholarship. My mother's happiness at this moment cannot be over emphasized. She realized how our financial predicament would have been a stumbling block to completing my secondary school education. My mother and I were later oriented on what was expected of us and the school I would be going to. I was more than excited to be at Chalo because of the many wonderful things I had heard about it.

My journey at Chalo has been one I would never regret. It's a very conducive environment with quality education and activities that I love. The students are friendly and very helpful. I'm taking seven subjects out of which Social Studies and Math are my favorite. In the speed Test One, I got the highest mark. In Social Studies I passed with 82%. I'm also actively involved in sports and performing arts where I demonstrated how to make a traditional bracelet. I have learnt the value of extending a hand to the people in need and with such I help to tutor my neighbor's daughter who is in grade two.

Kucetekela Foundation has taught me the value of selfless giving. I do not know my sponsors personally but their dedication towards helping a vulnerable child moves me. This is what I would term 'unconditional love.'

Coming from a small community and school, there was no way I would have heard of Kucetekela Foundation. This was until my teacher called me and four other students to sign forms in preparation for the group interview. He explained and gave testimonies on how some students from Jesus Army had been beneficiaries of the same program. This sounded like a great opportunity that I would not trade for anything.

With the knowledge about KF from my teacher, I tried as much as possible to respond well to questions during the interview. At first we were all nervous but the interviewers made us feel comfortable with some jokes to light up the moment. From the onset, I convinced myself that if others made it then I would too.

My teacher communicated to my parents that I had passed the interviews and needed to go and write exams at Chalo Trust

School. I did not know what to expect in the exam, but one thing I was sure about was putting in all the effort needed.

Fortunately enough I had made it to the family interview stage. Being at a great secondary school and later best university in the world has always been my dream. Making it to this point was enough assurance that I was only a few steps away from getting into the Kucetekela Foundation family.

During the interviews, I tried to be as comfortable as possible because this was a competitive scholarship hence I needed to show my competence. Later in the month we were informed that I had made it for the scholarship. It was the best time of my life and greatest achievement. My mother's eyes were filled with tears of joy because she could not believe that her daughter who schooled at a community school would now be attending high school at one of the best institutions in the country.

This was followed by the orientation at the office were I got to meet and interact with other students who had also made it.

I love the idea of being at a boarding school, it's one of the things that pushed me to work hard and get into the KF program. When I went to Chalo, the warm welcome from other KF students made me feel at home.

In academics I did impressively well in Business and Agriculture Studies. These are my new favorite subjects because the concepts are easier to understand. On the tenth of February I joined the communications forum club where I took part in a debate between senior and junior

students. Back in primary we did not have such activities and this is one of the things I have loved about being at Chalo. JETS is another club I'm part of and we had an activity called charades that taught us how to cooperate for a common goal. Every Wednesday I also attend sports trainings in volleyball, athletics and football.

I'm optimistic that so many wonderful things will arise by virtue of me being part of this scholarship. I'm more than grateful to Kucetekela Foundation for awarding me this opportunity which I will use to develop myself and the world around me.

In primary school I looked forward to graduating in a classic gown but now I see beyond that. Being in KF has made me see endless possibilities. During the family interview, Mr. Mukena explained so many things that KF does for their students. He talked of seminars, mentorship and so many other interesting things. I particularly got interested in seminars because I would love to travel abroad to the USA.

From the recruitment process till now, I learnt some important lessons which are hard work and patience. Through patience, endurance is produced which leads to character formation. I have now developed a more positive attitude towards life and circumstances.
