### THE LUSAKA CHOLERA OUTBREAK By Nchimunya Mukuwa



Cholera!! Throughout history it has been recorded to be one of the dangerous and deadly diseases mankind has ever faced. This disease is caused by a harmful germ that is found in contaminated substances or food stuffs. The disease causes severe vomiting and diarrhea to each infected individual.

At the beginning of this year, Zambia was hit with this cholera epidemic, and Lusaka was one of the most affected areas.

First, I didn't know what was going on. I was just hearing rumors about cholera. And I came to believe the rumors when I saw one of the headlines during the main news on Zambia National Broadcasting Corporation (ZNBC) which read "Cholera hits Lusaka and over 73 people have been recorded dead."

After reading the headline, my whole body froze to ice, and I felt sorry for people who had lost their lives from this disease due to lack of good hygiene precaution. At the same time, I was afraid that I might be the next one to be affected by this harmful disease. Cholera had affected my day -to-day activities in many ways. I was spending much time at home avoiding contacts with other people. I even used to miss church practices, because gatherings were not allowed at any point. When going to some places, like town, I had to walk because the authorities had discouraged public transport. This was to avoid contacts. It simply showed how my day-to-day activities were affected because my freedom was limited.

However, the media did a very good job in terms of public awareness on cholera, especially social media. It was the one that worked a lot. This was because it covered a wider range of people. Everyone could extract information on social media on how the disease was spreading and how it can be treated. I knew that the more people get to know about this disease, the safer measures the government would be able to put in place.

This cholera epidemic affected the school programmes in the entire Lusaka region. It disturbed the school activities in such a way that schools were forced to close and open a month later, which wasn't really good for students who are in grades twelve and nine (the exam classes). For me, my school had to change the school calendar, causing some other school activities to be cut off. To be specific, our sporting activities were disturbed.

We could not manage to prepare and practice harder

for the cross-country competition that was ahead of us. Therefore, we didn't manage to get first position. Instead, we came out second. I'm sure that if it weren't for the disturbance caused by the epidemic, we would have flown out with the first position.

Having gone through this much experience, I can say that this disease taught me some points that are really important. A country needs good hygiene, and it's up to us members of it to protect it. Also, as the public, following the rules that are placed to us is very important at any time, because it is through those same rules that we were saved. These rules include washing our hands, boiling our drinking water and many others.

During this same period of the cholera epidemic, I noted down two points that really surprised me a lot. The first one was that the government banned all kinds of gatherings, including spiritual, forgetting that it is only through the grace of God that we could come out of this situation. The other surprising thing was about my area. Despite it being a little bit unclean. there was no infection or death record that was found.

I experienced a lot during this period of the deadly epidemic, and I hope it will not repeat because it was really bad.

Chalo Trust School Grade 12 I learnt about the SAT prep in Grade 11 Term 3. We were expected to start during the December holiday preparing and learning.

My first reaction to this was fear of failing and nervousness. I began to think Mina, the KF fellow, was trying to test who was the best student among the Grade 11s. But it was about taking this exam to find better placements in university.

SATs consist of two subjects: English and mathematics. They contain topics from our school syllabus but they are advanced and depend on time and accuracy to finish them.

The SAT preps are led by Mina, who takes us through questions and helps us to grasp complicated concepts. It's two hours long, so we do one subject per hour and have assignments to take as homework or extra work. Additionally, it's student oriented in that we present our problems in dealing with the assignments and she introduces students who understand it better to explain.

During the two hours of learning we take exercises and assignments to do. These freak me out and make me feel like I will fail, but it helps to force myself while we are learning to understand the task and concepts guiding it. I also do some of those questions during my free time in class and complete assignments.

I have learnt a lot from this practice, but one surprising thing was how easy it is to identify figurations, parts of speech and reference of passages by simply using word choice and opinions of the writer. I have improved in my English exceptionally. I have also learnt exciting things in mathematics like how to do graphical equations just by using a simple

This time, I now feel free and less nervous to approach questions because I have had a test of some questions and what they ask for. I am certain in October when I write I will be more accurate and vigorous to do it. To achieve this, I will continue practicing how to read, work out and write the test within the allocated time by monitoring testing and engaging in group discussions to

formula and how to do equations of a circle.
