Yale Young African Scholars

The Young African Scholars Program is organized by Yale University, a prestigious tertiary education institution in the United States. It is aimed at preparing young leaders all over Africa who are currently in secondary education for college and university life. The program includes two seminars, one in Ethiopia and one in Ghana, at their respective country's university. Applying for the program is free, and if chosen, accommodation is provided for. The only thing the student is responsible for is transport to the location.

Two KF students, Titani and myself, were selected to attend the conference in Accra, Ghana from August 11th to 15th. This summer program includes seminars in global issues such as global public health, waste management, electricity and energy, politics, and conflict and wars. Titani attended sessions on GMOs, informal waste management, and local bush meat. I attended international fishing, electricity and energy, and pastoralism development. Yale faculty came to lead the discussions on these issues.

This has been a blessing and miracle, as I never thought I would have the opportunity to fly at this age. Being selected to this competitive program has taught me that life is about proving yourself and being the best that you can be in everything you do. I encourage my fellow KF students and peers to continue to set high

standards and strive for excellence. This includes being involved in co-curricular activities and community service, in addition to academics. We should focus on coming up with new projects and ideas on how to improve our communities.

For me, my experience as a climate change ambassador certainly helped me get to the point where I am now, and into this Yale program. It started in August 2013, when I was accepted to attend a fiveday climate change conference to be certified as a UNICEF ambassador and help unite climate change in Zambia. After this program and as an ambassador, I felt I needed to share this knowledge and sensitize my peers on the important issue of climate change. The most challenging part to trying to apply my knowledge in this way was a lack of interest and support. However, I persisted, and sensitization and a tree planting initiative have been successful.

Being a climate change ambassador has exposed me to a lot of successful people and organizations in our society. At the World Environment Day, I met people from the Ministry of Lands and connected with the Forestry Department, Zambia Environmental Managing Agency, and the Wildlife and Conservation Society. Such exposure has taught me how to relate with and communicate with different people, which have helped boost my confidence and self-esteem. These are important skills for both work and life.

Lastly, I wanted to say thank you to the Kucetekela Foundation and Mr. Oliver Barry. I enjoyed preparing for the conference with the KF Staff and Titani. I can't believe I'm going on a plane!
